



At the end of April we had our Annual Meeting for Storrington and this was a time to say a very heartfelt 'thank you' to Gwen Fisher who has stood down as Churchwarden after eight years, and a warm 'welcome' to Dennis Cowdray who has become our new warden, working alongside Barbara Buchanan. Gwen was one of the Churchwardens who interviewed me, welcomed me in to post and helped me navigate my way around Storrington Church, the building and the people. Gwen has put in many hours of work maintaining our beautiful historic building, liaising with our architect Richard Andrews, and chasing up builders over roofs, and Horsham District Council in the matter of churchyard walls and trees. Many thanks indeed Gwen, enjoy your free(er) time!

Another church officer has also changed this year at Storrington: Andrew Hammock has stood down as treasurer after holding the post for the last five years. Andrew has done a brilliant job of consolidating our finances and making sure that the accounts are always clear and up to date, and the clergy expenses are paid promptly – always important for impoverished clergy! Many thanks indeed, Andrew, for all your time and hard work on the finances, and you have left us in a much sounder and more secure place than you found us. Our Examiner for the accounts, Alex Spofforth, has also stood down year after doing this task for a number of years. Thank you Alex for generously giving of your time and expertise to keep our accounts in order. I am pleased to say that David Rice has kindly agreed to take on the role of treasurer, so welcome, David. 
I would like to take this opportunity to also say **thank you** to all the many people who so generously give of their time and talents to

## TRIBUTE TO ELLIE THORNTON

On Tuesday 4 April a quarter peal was rung on St Mary's, Thakeham Church bells, dedicated to Ellie Thornton. The quarter peal took 49 minutes to ring.



Ellie sadly died on 29 March following a road traffic accident whilst crossing the

road to catch the school bus. Ellie was 11 years old.

Approximately 80 – 100 of her family, school friends, neighbours and well-wishers came to hear the quarter peal, and stood or sat in and around the Church yard, and in the Church. Some residents of The Street sat in their gardens to listen.

It was a wonderful show of support for a grieving family, from a village community brought together by this tragedy.

## LIVES AT ST MARY'S, THAKEHAM

With Matt Harder, TGIF Leader

**So tell us a bit about who you are, where you come from** Well, my name's Matt Harder and originally I come from the Essex / London border, near Romford.

#### And how did you come to live in Thakeham?

It was through my work as a teacher. I knew I didn't want to teach in London, so after my teacher training, I found Wisborough Green School, which was perfect. A small rural school, which was so different to the schools I had worked in on my teaching practice. Whilst my then fiancée, Pippa, finished her teacher training, I lived in Horsham, and a year later she joined me. After we got married, we started looking for our own house close to where she and I worked, and Thakeham fitted the bill. Her parents live in Arundel so Thakeham has been the perfect location.

#### What drew you to St Mary's Thakeham as a church?

When living in Horsham, it was difficult to find the right church for us. The obvious choice was actually St Mary's in Horsham, which was the parish church where we had our banns read. We've actually been on a bit of a St Mary's tour - we were married in a St Mary's church at Lyminster. St Mary's in Horsham was similar to my family church back in Essex (not called St Mary's!) and Pippa was used to catholic-style services, but we didn't really connect with the church in Horsham. When we moved to Thakeham in September 2012, our first service at the Church was Midnight Mass, and we were pretty regular after that. It wasn't long before we were drawn in to the workings of the Church. As soon as they found out we were teachers and interested in youth work, they wouldn't let us go! Then they found I was a previous chorister at my family church, so music group also conscripted me. Pippa hadn't been in a choir, but she was so good at singing they let her in anyway! Four years later, and we now run the older youth group, TGIF (Thank God It's Friday), and still involved in the music side of things at the all-age services.

## How has your relationship with God supported you in your move here, work, church life etc.?

It seems that God has been looking out for us quite a bit. We always say things happen for a reason. I had a bit of a crazy experience when interviewing for Wisborough Green School. My car engine exploded in the middle of the motorway, so I missed my interview slot. Pippa managed to pick me up and drive me to the school, but I was about 5 hours late. They still interviewed me and I got the job immediately. I really felt God's calming presence whilst standing in the middle of three lanes of motorway traffic. It was guite surreal – I'd never felt something like that before. Then when Pippa was just about to finish her teacher training, I just happened to look on an education jobs website, and found that a school only 4 miles from my school (Loxwood) was looking for a teacher. It was perfect, and she got the job. This year I've started up my own business in Forest School and Bushcraft training, which seems to be going really well. We have been incredibly blessed, now even more so with a 2 and a half year-old daughter who is a joy (most of the time!), a lovely community, and friends and neighbours who are just brilliant. We are so thankful for everything.

## **MESSAGE** FROM BISHOP MARK

Dear Friends.

'Thy Kingdom Come' is a phrase that trips off the tongue of Christians every time they pray the Lord's Prayer. It sums up the purpose of Jesus and of his body, The Church. We exist, with Jesus, to build the Kingdom of God. We do that, in part, by seeking to transform the unjust structures of society and conforming them to the intentions of God. We also do it by sharing our faith, hope and love with others. However we help build the Kingdom of God, we must do it in partnership with God and so pray as Jesus taught us: Thy Kingdom come. Prayer is what ensures our partnership with God. Without it, we risk trying to establish not his Kingdom, but some lesser vision of our own.

Thy Kingdom Come has become the title and focus of a worldwide wave of prayer during the period between Ascension Day and Pentecost (25 May - 4 June, this year). Every one of us is invited to join in this wave of prayer that more people may come to know, love and follow Jesus, and so become joyful fellowworkers in building up God's Kingdom.

There are countless ways to join in this worldwide wave of prayer, as churches, as families or groups, or quietly as individuals. Last year, many churches hosted day-long events embracing many different kinds of corporate and individual prayer. I was privileged to share in several. **BREAD OF ANGELS** 

Feeding on the Word by Barbara Brown Taylor Canterbury Press, 978-1-84825-781-8 £12.99

If you are looking for something different to enliven your personal Bible reading, then I thoroughly commend *Bread of Angels*. Barbara Brown Taylor is a beautiful writer and in this book she takes passages and characters from the Bible and explores God's provision and the surprising ways in which he



supplies, just like the manna in the wilderness. Take for example chapter 7, the Wilderness Exam. Lent begins with this story but the exam is at the end of the 40 days. Taylor takes us into and out of Jesus' encounter with the Devil in an imaginative and telling way. The last section on "Apocalyptic Figs" is intriguing as she takes us into the strange parables and sayings about which Jesus told as His earthly life drew to an end. The chapters are short and so are ideal for incorporating into our daily readings and, like the manna, they will provide ample food for thought for each day.

# **SULLINGTON 122 YEARS AGO**

## EXTRACTS FROM CANON PALMER'S DIARY - MAY 1895

Wed 1: Fine morning then a cold rain from the north west. School 30. The first tennis party projected today, only Mrs Clarkson and son, rain intervening. Elms just showing leaf. Meadows forward.

Thu 2: Fine after a cold night. School 30. Haines left on foot for Pulborough. Pay heavy bills at Storrington to E Hammond and Greenfields. Fallen sycamore, move lemons.

Fri 3: Fine and fresh. To County Council at Horsham taking Jervoise: the great 'Universal Road Scheme' abandoned: a barren discussion on some further amendments. Brought Parker 'primus' back, a tall stripling of 6 foot and more topped by a tall hat.

Sat 4: As yesterday. Worked with Green for his last day before going. Mackonechys called and visited everything. Dining room chimney on fire, not for the first time. Played a few games of tennis.

Sun 5: Auntie Doris birthday. Warm. Congregations very fair, only 5 to Holy Communion and a contingent from Wantley. Preached old sermon on the Lessons of Springtime and in the evening on Balaam.

Mon 6 and Tue 7: Very fine and bright. Passed two days in town and Benges returning home on Tuesday evening.

Wed 8: As yesterday, summery. Grand weather. Clara and I walk to Wantley and leave cards on the Pagets. Repair Copse walk by chalking and road drift. Take cold bath the first time this year. Put out some plants.

Thu 9: Fine and summery. School 29. To the Mackonechy's in evening. May and Parker to tennis. 'Parker the first' leaves us.

Fri 10: Sunny but cooler. A Drawing Inspector appears at the school 3/4 hour late. Then Mr Felton and Duke again made church wardens at a Vestry. 'Poor' Felton says he must reduce his subscription! and takes £5 off the school but makes up the balance due to the Church. Green returns 'hopeful'; this may make me give up the school on Miss Jarman's retirement.

Sat 11: Magnificently fine throughout. Disappointed in the failure of Green in his Matriculation at Magdalen. The boys went out all day on the river at Amberley. I to Cobden visiting all. Quite a July day.

Sun 12: Easter IV. Very hot, close and dull. 62 degrees. Morning congregations pretty full. Preached on second lesson and in evening on Paul's conversion. No evening lighting for the first time. Has been a thundery day. White lilac out.

Mon 13: As yesterday. Has been over-warm. Put out tomatoes. Sat out late on lawn. By Clara's wish dismissed Ernest Knowles.

Tue 14: As yesterday though duller 64 degrees. A long morning 9.30 - 2.30 at Board, and warm in more ways than one was our meeting "much ado about nothing". Mrs Paget and Lady Blanche Hozier called. Too hot for much exertion.

Wed 15: Fresh and cool 54 degrees. NB 10 degrees different overnight. School 30. Some tennis here: a few only, quite cold and windy. Cleaned the grass off our grave. Had an interview with the Surveyor of Highways.

Thu 16: Cold and fine. School 30. In winter again! 18 degrees between Tuesday night and this! Clara and May to Stopham to meet Brian Bartellots. I with the boys take a round by Lushes, Gilbert to look at a pony at Grenhurst but found it 31 years old.

Fri 17: Very cold and dull 45 degrees. Rode to Pulborough Rectory where Bartellot as Rural Dean muddly as usual. Took notes for the conference elections. Bartellot, D and self.

Sat 18: Dull and murky. Cold wind. Boys went out for their afternoon to Amberley and Arundel.

Sun 19: Easter V. As yesterday. Had a fairly full church in morning 53, of whom 27 were children! Sermon on the first lesson Duet V 1 the need of 'heart' in obeying the Commandments. In evening thinner (cold and wintry).

Mon 20: Rather softer wind lulls. Old Humphrey at the Church doors and floors. All but self go to Cissbury to the Surrey and East Hants Yeomanry.

Tue 21: Warmer. School 30. Edward sailed in the Hawarden Castle on Saturday for Madeira.

Wed 22: As yesterday. To Brighton for 'poor' committee. Furbished up a report which will deal with the subject. Lunched with Harry

Thu 23: Ascension. As yesterday. School 30. Our service this evening at 6pm thinly attended by about a dozen only. Spoke on

Fri 24: Much as yesterday, very close. Clara took May into Worthing, they sleep at Kate's tonight. Worked all day with the boys. Humphrey 'elevating' the summer house. Green and I to Chiltington, falling in curiously with one Shaw who had just bought the Clementine pony we were going to see.

Sat 25: As yesterday. Some thunder, no rain. Fetched Clara and May from Worthing. Mrs Marten arrives on her annual visit. Make a little 'dip' into the Manufactured Marble Company.

**Sun 26:** Very fine and warm. Two satisfactory congregations. Morning old sermon on the anchorage of the soul within. A splendid passage to hold on by, an extempore on our Lord's last command. Baptised a child of the Slaughters'.


Mon 27: As yesterday. May XVIII. A large lawn party, perfect weather, could sit out quite late. Bought with Mrs Marten's aid a £5 pony from one Shaw. Dear May well and happy.

Tue 28: As yesterday, hot. To Board of Guardians. Parsons disposed of by a direct command from LGB through Bourke re Form of Appointing of Overseer. I do not think the decision guite in accordance with the LGB. Mr Bart called: a chatty, sensible little fellow: told him of Wiggonholt. Put out a few geraniums but ground

**Wed 29:** Very warm. School 28. Little done this extremely hot Derby Day upon which there has been sometimes snow! Sam Stringer in the church yard. Begin cutting front meadow (machine).

Thu 30: Very hot, thundery. Some rain in evening. Lord Leconfield withholds his annual donation in consequence of recent legislation ..... alas! these poor men! Will he drink one bottle of wine the less. Visitation, fearfully hot. Weak charge from Mount who did not remain to lunch.

Fri 31: Much cooler. School 26. Jarman goes off to Parham. Mr and Mrs Wyatt in afternoon and a young Watson. Kate Gibson comes to see Mother.

All CCT churches are Grade II or above and hold the key to much of our history; they are open and ready for visitors all year round. 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## STORRINGTON & SULLINGTON – REFLECTIONS OF THE PAST

### **OUR DISTRICT COUNCIL**

Before Chanctonbury District Council came into being, the local parishes were administered by Thakeham District Council, who worked from a small office - actually a tin shack - at the top of School Hill. In 1894 the Local Government Act which established the Parish Councils also created Rural and Urban District Councils. elected by those eligible to vote in parliamentary elections. The old Rural Sanitary Authority, formed from the Thakeham Union which ran the workhouse under the Public Health Act of 1872, gave birth to the Thakeham Rural District Council in 1895 under the 1894 Act. A paid official, a lawyer known as the Clerk of the Council, carried out the business of the new District Council. Mr Herbert Parsons, a solicitor, was the first Clerk of the Council, starting work late in the day and finishing late in the evening. He had a simple filing system: a large sack which he emptied onto the floor when he needed to find something. The district administered in 1895 included the parishes of Coldwaltham in the west, to Wiston in the east and from N.Stoke, Parham, Storrington, Sullington and Wiston in the south to Pulborough, W.Chiltington, Thakeham, Warminghurst and Ashington in the north, a total of 18 parishes. The 'sanitary' aspect of responsibilities was not arduous before WWII as most people drew

their water from wells, and sanitary arrangements were accommodated by privies, or earth closets, in their gardens, emptied by a man with a horse and cart and a bucket arrangement on a pole, who went around at night, accompanied by the sound of slamming windows.

One of the best remembered locally was Mr Rewell, who had a beautiful horse kept in fine condition, with a lovely shiny coat. Another service of the TRDC was to define and register all public footpaths, bridleways and 'soft' roads, 27 years before the Public Rights of Way Act.

In 1894, a boy of 14 started work with the Thakeham Board of Guardians Rural Sanitary Authority. That year, the Local Government Act, creating the District Councils, came into force and marked a long and distinguished career for Percy Ayling, that 14-year-old,

who became Clerk of the Council in 1908.

His early years often meant working very long hours, sometimes until midnight. He was responsible in his time as Clerk for introducing a pioneering housing project; he discovered that farm and railway workers from Pulborough could not rent cottages because of high rents demanded for inadequate cottages, and persuaded the Council to buy land and use direct labour to build three-bedroomed cottages to a high standard, paying the workers on them one farthing or one halfpenny above the rate. The Council even made their own bricks. By 1944, 489 new cottages had been erected. Land at W Chiltington was purchased for £4.9.0d and at Storrington for £10.13.4d. The houses were rented for 7s 6d per week if they had no parlour and 10s.6d with a parlour. Mr Ayling also introduced piped water at Storrington after a survey of wells in 1916 reported a great deal of pollution. In that year, 100miles of pipes carried clean water to every village in the district, even as far as Horsham. The cost of the water supply for Storrington by 1929 was £861.2.9d. The little tin shack was becoming woefully inadequate for all this work and temporary accommodation was added, which served until the move of the Chanctonbury Rural District Council, which replaced the TRDC, to Chanctonbury House in 1964. The two World Wars added considerably to the TRDC's workload: voluntary enumerators

for National Registration were permitted to use the village hall, together with a local tribunal, under the Military Service Act, which also required space, as well as the Food and Coal Control and the War Agricultural Committee. The Rating and Valuation Act came into force in 1925, the task taken over from the old Guardians of the Poor. The TRDC was relieved of highways administration which had been passed over to the County Councils.

Percy Ayling enjoyed recreation as well as his heavy workload, despite which he always made himself available to ratepayers who wanted to consult him. He never recommended the Council to take legal action until every means of persuasion had been tried. He wrote short stories and poems, enjoyed long walks on the Downs, especially when he had a problem to think about and solve, and always spent Christmas Day in the workhouse, serving meals to

the inmates. He was one of the initiators of the campaign to save Sullington Warren from development, and he played cricket for local teams as a batsman and fast bowler. He admitted he found slip fielding difficult by 1932 without glasses, but continued bowling, at the end of that season having taken 62 wickets for nine runs each, saying it was not bad for his 52 years.



The TRDC published their accounts after their financial year ended on 31 March. Some Mr HW Rydon items from the 1930 Abstract, covering the

two years of 1929 and 1930, are of interest. The councillors from each parish included Mr HW Rydon, Vice-chairman of the TRDC representing Greatham, whose name is remembered in Rydon School built in 1939, and Col HV Ravescroft JP for Storrington - a great benefactor to the village. Sullington was represented by Commdr RH Demuth OBE. The combined population of the 18 parishes totalled 8,419 in 1921 in an area of 40,632 acres.

The 1929 schedule of income included Ministry of Transport grants for highway staff £229, removal of house refuse £11.5.0d, housing assisted scheme under the 1919 Act £4,495.5.3d, and the non-State-aided housing scheme £124.16.0d. General rates raised for the whole district were £27,183.18.3d. Under 'Expenditure', the Council spent £11871.17.10d on highways' maintenance and improvement, £582.1.9d on removal of house refuse, Housing Assisted Schemes under the 1919 Act £4667.6.0d, not state-aided £99.0.1. Land at W Chiltington was purchased for £4.9.0d and at Storrington for £10.13.7d. Elections cost the Council £34.6.2d and general parochial precepts £168.0.0d, the total expenditure for the year was £42,175.13.4d. By the end of the financial year 1930 their total income was £39,516.19.2d and expenditure £39,622.15.3d. Twenty houses had been erected at Storrington under the 1919 Act; the rent was 7s 6d for the non-parlour type and 10s 6d for houses with a parlour.

The last major change in the second tier of local government came in 1974, when total reorganisation enlarged the administrative area to include Coldwaltham to Woodmancote, Upper Beeding to the county border at Rusper, Warnham and Rudgewick.

For those fortunate enough to be walking on the Downs, hearing the cascade of skylark song raises the spirits, as does the sight of cowslips brightening up the landscape. Neither pleasure can be bought, but both are enjoyed freely. Truly priceless. Skylarks are fewer than they were (loss of habitat), whereas cowslips are making a comeback, thanks to seeding and protection. If we wish to hear the lark or see wild flowers, not just for our benefit but for that of future generations, conservation is essential, and makes for a healthy environment.

This is true for so much wildlife of value. Conservationists are not an endangered species (yet), even so, adding to their number will ensure their survival and effectiveness. Wildlife needs them. Being involved brings its own reward. Give it a go!

Keeping streams free of rubbish and other pollution is part of conservation, so our work party on 1 April was busy clearing banks and the stream at Riverside Walk between Love Lane and Fryern Dell. Among other rubbish, we found bicycle parts, masonry, scrap iron, bottles, cans and plastic items. Our next Saturday work party is on **6 May** starting at 10am. We will be carrying out similar work on the stretch of stream used for the Duck Race. We meet in the Library car park, equipment is provided. 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## STORRINGTON & DISTRICT MUSEUM

On 6 March, Storrington & District Museum Society held its 12th Annual General Meeting. This was followed by a talk given by Hermin Daley, An Actor's Life For me! Introduced to the strains of There's no business like show business, Hermin told how she became stage struck at the age of ten and went on to act with the West Chiltington Dramatic Society in the primitive Old Comrade's Hall, which had no facilities and a corrugated roof, in a play called Seagulls Over Sorrento. This was an all-male production so the women were dressed as WRENs and sold programmes, but nevertheless the production won a country-wide competition.

Then came a five minute part where she had dinner on stage with an old gentleman, and then came *The Poltergeist*, when all the lights failed (nothing to do with the poltergeist). She acted in comedies, tragedies, pantomimes, and musicals, and experienced the whole set collapsing, an actor coming on in the wrong costume and another who couldn't learn his lines and missed out three pages of the script. On one occasion an actor came on stage with his wig on back to front! In another play, they had to have a goat on stage, but the goat would only go on with his friend, a dog, and then wouldn't go on at all, so they just had the dog. The watchword was always, "just carry on".

Hermin has been in Salad Days, Guys and Dolls, My Fair Lady, The Teahouse of the August Moon, melodramas and old time music halls. She has played a cockney, a Russian, a lesbian murderer, a Japanese Geisha, and Polly Peacham in The Beggar's Opera. In addition, she has done many other jobs for the Dramatic Society, except lighting, but including production. It sounded as though she had a wonderful time.

She has been associated with the Museum since 1998, and with Meg Everett and Molly MacCreadie she did enactments of Queen Elizabeth First and her Ladies in Waiting at Rye, Hastings, Cowdray Ruins and Arundel Castle. She has loved every minute of it and felt very honoured that she has now been made President of West Chiltington Dramatic Society. Hermin's closing words? "Do put your daughter on the stage, Mrs Worthington". It was a lovely light-hearted talk.

Quirky Collections 2 opened on 1 April. On view is a selection from the Museum's own collection of rarely viewed objects, and a number of collections from a friend's treasure trove of owls, bells, and paperweights, and much more. It is obvious there are few things which are not collectible.

At the end of March, a full house enjoyed another quiz night with Stephen and Christine Turrell, with Oscar, their dog. The questions were as aggravating as ever, and the decision of when to play the joker was almost impossible to make because the set headings were completely enigmatic. The supper in the interval was delicious. Thank you Stephen, Christine and the cooks.

On 3 April, Anthony Pratt gave the Museum Society a talk entitled Arun Valley Postcards, during which we meandered gently down river from Palingham Lock to the sea at Littlehampton, looking at postcards from the late 19th and early 20th century of the villages we passed through, augmented by some film footage and a modern commentary. We saw Tony Pratt launch his tiny boat, The Trog, into a very weedy, reedy, river, overhung with low branches, and he explained how this was an important waterway in the past for local produce to be taken downstream, and coal and fertiliser brought back. We travelled through parkland near Stopham to Stopham Bridge which had been built in the reign of Edward III (1312-1377) and had its central arch raised in 1822 to accommodate shipping. Many of the canal boars were more like barges, having sails. They were mainly horse drawn though, and had no living quarters on board. Mr Doick's barge was fifty feet long. He came from Pulborough where he was a bell ringer.

Mr Drewett from Church Street in Storrington, cycled everywhere, taking photographs and making them into postcards. We saw his postcard of Houghton Bridge, with a wharf for the chalk pits, now Amberley Museum, and motor boats. At Houghton village we saw

Pebble Cottage, the Post Office, and the George and Dragon Inn. Then we left the river and went up on the Downs for a 58 second glider flight, a feat which held the record till after the First World War. This was the beginning of the Southdown Glider Club. We saw views of Burpham when the river ran much closer to the village before the loop in the canal was made, and nearby we saw Peppering Farm where the film *Tansy* was made, where men stood in the river in barrels to dip the sheep.

We went to Arundel where we met Tickner Edwards and saw the same corner by Arundel Bridge photographed over several years, the earliest with horses only and the last having only motorised vehicles. The river was full of boats, some for pleasure trips to the Black Rabbit and beyond, but most were working boats, such as a collier with black sails and six crew which carried 400 tons of coal four or five times a year from Newcastle.

At the end we arrived in Littlehampton which was full of boats being built or repaired or moored up discharging cargo. There were shots of the Chain Ferry and of the Swing Bridge. To finish, there were magic lantern slides of wartime Littlehampton, with camouflaged ships, and an amazing picture of a forest of ship masts. It was a nostalgic show which I would like to hear all over again to take it in more completely.

There will be no more Monday talks until 4 September, when the winter programme will begin, but a few summer evening walks have been arranged. The first will be a short walk, with three styles and probably some mud, on **Monday 8 May**. We will meet at 6.30pm at Thakeham Church car park. Please telephone 743437 for more details.

On Monday 13 March, Andrew Elms, of Lordington Lavender Farm which is situated at Funtingdon just outside Chichester, gave a fascinating, and sometimes very amusing, talk about the trials and tribulations of starting up a field of Lavender on their farm



In 2000, prior to starting this new project, they had 180 dairy cows but because the cost of producing the milk was more than the selling price, they decided to diversify. With conservation of the environment in mind, they decided to use five of their twenty acre site to plant out Maillette Lavender from Provence in France. With the arrival of 25,600 plug plants, Andrew described in great detail the work involved in planting out and producing lavender oil. The field has now been in flower for 16 years. The lavender fields attract bees and butterflies, together with around 12 different species of birds. There are also bee hives on site.

They have a shop where you can purchase lavender oil in various forms. It can be used for viral and fungal infections, mouth ulcers, nits in children, helps with sleep and various skin complaints, gets rid of flies, mosquitoes and midges and spraying wardrobes, jumpers and carpets gets rid of moths. Liquid soap and bath oil is sold at their farm, including a balm for skin and lips, and shampoo for ticks and flees on dogs. Lavender essence can be used in cooking such as cakes and gravies. They also sell lavender candles. There is also a café.

They can be found at farmers' markets throughout Sussex, Hampshire and Kent. BBC and ITV have filmed on the site and various newspapers have taken pictures of the lavender field. The lavender flowers from June to November. The farm has open days during June and details of opening times can be found on their website. You will need to book your ticket in advance.

At our next meeting on **8 May**, Mark Howard from Brinsbury College will be giving a talk, and the competition will be 'A Single Tulip'. Our first Plant Sale of the year takes place on **Saturday 20 May**. Doors open at 2pm so don't be late as we normally sell out quickly.

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In the absence of the President due to holidays, the March meeting was opened by the Deputy President, Liz Allen Williams, who welcomed members and two visitors.

The President's and Secretary's reports were given, both highlighting the number of events available to members organised by our own Institute, as well as at County and National level; no time to be bored in the WI. These reports were followed by the Treasurer's statement

The speaker for the evening was introduced, Carol Goodman. Carol was assisted by her daughter, her talk entitled From Sheep to Knitting-wool. Members were told how she had been knitting since the age of five, and it had remained her passion ever since. Five years ago, Carol became interested in spinning and, after having had the opportunity to try operating a spinning wheel, she decided to purchase her own and join a class. Sixteen months after joining, Carol took over the class herself. Members were told once the fleece had been delivered it had to be washed thoroughly, which is no easy task; this job falls on Carol's husband, using copious amounts of warm water and baby shampoo. Then it must be hosed down two or three times and dried completely. The wool fibres are then put through a series of combing steps, called carding, which can be done with small hand cards that look like dog brushes, or a carding machine can be used. This process produces a wool web called rovings. The next step is the spinning, which pulls and twists the fibres together to form a continuous thread. Carol showed members the tools of her trade: the spinning wheel, carding machine, umbrella swift and the niddy-noddy, all needed in the process of spinning. Many members enjoyed the experience of using the spinning wheel and carding machine. Daphne Patch gave the vote of thanks.

Following refreshments, social time this month was a relaxed time, allowing members time to read all the information available for the forthcoming events, and time to catch up with friends. The Deputy President closed the meeting after the raffle was drawn.

The next meeting will be held on **17 May.** This is the Annual Resolutions meeting when members vote on the Resolutions selected by members at a National level. New members and visitors are always welcome; we meet on the 3rd Wednesday of each month, (2nd Wednesday December) at 7.30pm at Sullington Parish Hall. ## A NEW HIGH SHERIFF AT PARHAM

Lady Emma Barnard is embarking on her year as High Sheriff of West Sussex. This ancient role, dating back to Saxon times, brings together important threads in the life of our nation and County.

The High Sheriff of West Sussex, Lady Emma Barnard, in the Great Hall at Parham

High Sheriff as her Chaplain to her first church engagement, the Deanery Service on Passion Sunday at St Mary's, Storrington. The Rural Dean, the Revd Kathryn Windslow, welcomed Lady Emma and gathered us in worship and prayer. The service brought together members of congregations from across the Storrington Deanery.

movingly on truth and the importance of being united in faith.

I caught up with Lady Emma at her Sussex home, Parham House. Thanks to Emma and her family's stewardship Parham is a gathering and generous place. The April spring weather blesses us with a moment of warmth and light as we sit and talk. She is clearly excited about the coming year and says "I'm really looking forward to promoting the importance of our country churches. I also want to celebrate the quiet heroes in West Sussex; those people who add to the richness of life in our county by constantly contributing in so many ways without seeking praise or acknowledgement." I comment that the exceptional is so often to be found in the everyday and she agrees.

Emma explains that she is not the first High Sheriff to live at Parham; "There have only been three families who have lived at Parham and each family has fulfilled the office of High Sheriff. Thomas Palmer was the first in 1571. He inherited Parham from his

father and was much regarded by Elizabeth I. The Bisshopps were next. Thomas Bisshopp was High Sheriff in 1583 before he bought Parham in 1601. His son, Sir Edward, held the office in 1636 under Charles I. The Hon Robert Curzon followed under William IV in 1834.

Then there was greatgrandfather, Clive Pearson, who fell in love with Parham and carefully restored this fine Elizabethan house during the

1920s and '30s. I share his delight in sharing the joys of Parham with visitors. It is extraordinary to think that he was the High

Sheriff in 1940 as the Battle of Britain was being fought the skies over Sussex."




Like Parham, the role of High Sheriff is steeped in history. Originally known as 'Shire Reeves', they were Royal officials appointed to enforce the King's interests in the county. In particular they were responsible for the collection of revenues and the enforcement of law and order. Their extensive powers included the right to summon a posse comitatus, a military force, to enforce the law. It has often been suggested that it was Queen Elizabeth I who first marked the appointment of her High Sheriffs by pricking their names through on the Sheriff's Roll. In fact there are earlier vellum examples dating back to the reign of Henry VII. Nevertheless the tradition of the Monarch pricking the names of the High Sheriffs continues to this

The role of the High Sheriff today is rooted in its history. Lady Emma will be called upon to support the Royal Family, the Lord-Lieutenant, the Judiciary, the Police, the emergency services, local authorities, and the Church and faith groups. Hospitality to visiting High Court Judges and promoting the voluntary organisations in West Sussex will also be central to Lady Emma's shrieval year.

Despite the duties of High Sheriff, Lady Emma and her team were excitedly preparing for the 2017 season. Parham House and Gardens will welcome visitors, as it has done over centuries, as it opens to the public. More information is available at www. parhaminsussex.co.uk or telephone 742021.

On Wednesday 5 April, Dr Rosamund Bartlett gave a scintillating lecture on Russian art. She began the lecture by describing the painting of Russian icons. In medieval times these were in the Byzantine style but over time Russian artists developed their own style and introduced vivid colours into their work. In the early years, icons were of religious figures, but by 17th Century the icon-style of painting was used to depict tsars and other prominent figures. One of the greatest artists of icons was Andrey Rublyov.

From the 18th Century art in Russia was influenced by European artists and painting of landscapes became popular. These were not really of the Russian countryside as it was believed it was too dull compared with that of Italy and other European countries. However, from the 19th Century art depicted Russian themes. One of the most atmospheric paintings at this time was The Rooks Have Returned by Aleksei Savrasov, which did show the Russian countryside in a most charming way.

Dr Bartlett mentioned many artists including Venetsianov (Harvesting in Summer), Vasilev (Clouds), Levitan (Spring Flood), Repin (Barge-haulers on the Volga), Chagall (The Poet Reclining) and Malevich (Black Square).

# STORRINGTON HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY

Clive Gravett gave an interesting talk on the History of Lawn and Lawnmowers showing many illustrations of the first mowers. Before mowers came into production, the only way to cut lawns was to use a scythe which took time and effort. The lawn mower was invented in 1830 by Edwin Beard Budding, an engineer from Stroud, Gloucestershire. He obtained the idea after seeing a machine in a local cloth mill which used a cutting cylinder mounted on a bench to trim cloth to make a smooth finish after weaving.

Budding realised that a similar concept would enable the cutting of grass if the mechanism could be mounted in a wheel frame to make the blades rotate close to the lawn's surface. He went into partnership with a local engineer and started a factory producing mowers. The early machines were made of cast iron.



Over the years, steam-powered engines and even horse-pulled machines were tried. Motorised mowers appeared in the 1890's, as lightweight petrol engines and small steam power units became available, and in the 1920's electric power and rotary cutting were introduced.

The major innovation of the last 30 years has been the rotary hover using lightweight plastics, and the first 'hover' machine came into use in the early 60's. Nowadays with such a vast array of machines on offer; mowing the lawn is a much easier task thanks to Edwin Budding.

## FRYERN LADIES' PROBUS

On a fine and sunny day, forty ladies gathered together at The Roundabout Hotel with magnolias in full bloom, to enjoy the April meeting. After a warm welcome from the President, Anne Ford- Robertson, she announced that founder



member, Pat Guiver, was now living in residential care with her husband and that two no

residential care with her husband and that two new members were present. Former President, Maureen Girard, was presented with a special badge and following an enjoyable lunch, the President introduced the speaker for the afternoon, Mr James Burn, talking on behalf of the popular charity, Help for Heroes.

With the aid of films and slides, James was able to give a clear insight into the valuable and essential work of this well-known organisation, now in its 10th year. Founded in 2007, on the recommendation of General Sir Richard, now Baron Dannatt, groups of adults set about fund-raising to provide much-needed money to help the many service personnel wounded in various areas of conflict, namely Iraq and Afghanistan. It had become obvious that with the numbers of those surviving serious wounds, ongoing help would be needed for many years to come.

One of the first facilities to be opened was a new swimming pool at Headley Court and, as funds became available, new premises were built and opened in different areas of the country, trying to keep survivors in groups to aid recovery and rehabilitation, together with full support for the whole family. An holistic approach is used, covering physical and psychological well-being, as well as practical guidance on nutrition, sleep, money management and careers advice.

Help for Heroes combines with other charities, such as Combat Stress, Winston's Wish, Blind Veterans UK and the Band of Brothers and Sisters Fellowships. Grants to individuals are available for particular needs, such as specially adapted mobility equipment. So far over 10,000 men and women from the combined forces of Army, Navy and Air Force have been helped and £120m has been spent. As this is an ongoing and developing situation, around £30m is needed annually to support this great cause.

A saying often quoted is: "Everyone has an Everest to climb, but at different heights," and that is something that rings true for all of us. Looking towards the future, we all have to maintain our awareness that those who put their lives on the line will need support for the rest of their lives and mental scars can emerge years later which need to be dealt with. These 'hidden wounds,' as they are known, such as anxiety, depression, anger, alcohol abuse and stress are on the increase and will continue to be in the years ahead, so this valuable charity relies on the generosity of the public.

The talk was rounded off by a moving film of survivors and their stories. James was warmly thanked by Ann Salmon and there was a retiring collection for the charity.

The meeting on **4 May** features a talk on 'The Nature Year, January to June' by Peter Lovett.

## CRICKET IN STORRINGTON



#### The new season has arrived!

A reminder that our senior League starts on **Saturday 6 May**, when we play Findon. Other opponents during the League season are Warnham, Portslade, West Wittering, Barns Green, Aldwick, Lancing Manor, and Worthing. Prospective new members, playing or social, should contact our Chairman, Steve Watkins, on 744217.

For our Cygnets, the first outdoor training session is on **Friday 5 May** at 6pm, coupled with registration for all young players, past and prospective. Thereafter, to fit in with matches, the outdoor training sessions will be held on either Sundays or Fridays.

We have entered teams in the Under 12 (hard ball) and Under 10 (soft ball) West Sussex Leagues. The Under 12's will be playing West Wittering, Littlehampton, Midhurst, and Pulborough on a home and away basis, whilst the Under 10's will be playing Worthing, Broadwater, Findon, Pulborough, Chippendale, and East Preston. An Under 8 team will be playing in festival tournaments for their age group, and friendlies are being arranged for our new Under 14 girls' team. The Club's ambitious plan for a two lane outdoor net is progressing well: a preferred supplier has been identified, a presentation to the Parish Council is scheduled preparatory to making a formal planning application, and various fund raising avenues are being explored. This is the most expensive project the Club has ever undertaken, the main purpose of which is to provide a safe and modern practice facility for our ever expanding Colts section. In the meantime, the existing one lane, rather basic, net has been repaired and refurbished in order to facilitate the Cygnets' hard ball practice.

In another century, it was popular for cricket clubs to arrange matches between their married and single players, usually to round off the season. One of these matches at Storrington took place on Tuesday, 7 September 1852. The married players scored 59 runs in their only innings to secure victory by 13 runs as, in reply, the single players were bowled out for 46 runs. The singles did, in fact, start a second innings before the game's appointed finish time, after which everyone adjourned to the White Horse Inn for supper that was accompanied by rousing toasts and songs.
