LETTER FROM BISHOP MARK OF HORSHAM

REMEMBRANCE

My grandfather fought at The Somme but died when I was a little boy. My late mother was



only thirteen when the Second World War ended. I have no memory whatsoever of those wars that our annual Remembrance Sunday first commemorated. There is, however, no sign of these commemorations disappearing with the generations who lived through the great wars of the twentieth century. What, though, do we mean today by 'remember'?

Literature, photography and film-making preserve our awareness of the sacrifices made during the world wars. Subsequent conflicts continue to take the lives of those serving in the armed forces. We remember what we have learned about the horrors of the past wars and we remember those who, today, put their lives on the line, often in the cause of peace in distant countries. We remember and honour servicemen and women who lay aside their personal safety for the sake of others.

Images of the Christian Soldier are less popular than once they were, but it is worth remembering that a soldier fights for king and kingdom, never for self but always for the rights and wellbeing of those who cannot fight for themselves. Ought we not all to be soldiers of Christ and of his advancing Kingdom?

THE SISTERS MEMORIAL FUND

Here is an update on the memorial fund set up to provide a permanent reminder of the 40 years' service these remarkable ladies gave to our community.

Before I set up the fund, I spoke with Eileen's stepsons and explained what I wanted to do, and suggested the bench could go near the bus stop at the Southern Entrance of Abingworth Crescent, subject to the relevant permission from Oakford Homes. Permission has been granted.

I chose this site as it is where children catch the school bus, and the sisters loved all the children. Both stepsons were delighted and thought this was the obvious place. It will be visible from Little House where they grew up.

Thanks to so many of you generously contributing, and I am delighted to report that I have been able to place an order for an anti-vandal bench, and a memorial plaque. The bench has cast iron sides and mild steel slats, is maintenance free, and will last for at least 100 years. I have placed an order with Roger Watts of Country Crafts to lay a sand and cement slab so the bench can be bolted down. This will be laid in the next few weeks, and the delivery time for the bench is 5-6 weeks.

If all goes well we will see the bench some time in November.

LIVES AT ST MARY'S THAKEHAM

This month we meet Cliff Purvis, a Sides-person within our Church community

What brought you to live in Thakeham?

I began my working life at the apprentice college of the Royal Army Pay Corps at Worthy Down near Winchester at 16 years of age having wanted to be a soldier since I was a young boy. Three years later I transferred to the Royal Military Police ending my Army career 11 years later in Chichester at the training depot as a recruit Squad Instructor. I then joined Sussex Police serving in uniform, CID and various central service squads. In 1986 I met Allison for the first time and we became partners in 1994 and I moved to Cowfold to be with her living in a town house. Allison said, 'It would be nice to have a garden!' Having discussed the pros and cons we agreed to move to find one, and the hunt was on. Here in Thakeham, a year later, we found the house of our dreams, and the garden too - we have now been here eleven years.

Of the range of services at Thakeham which do you prefer?

The All Age Family Communion; I love having Christenings as part of the service, children running freely joining in with us - thoughtfulness in the simplicity of the prayers and the richness of the music group. I am also a lover of Christmas and all it entails: the Christmas Services and the carols (this year I will join the choir too – though everything will have to be sung in D flat!). Allison often says I pick a note and hang onto it for dear life no matter what the tune is doing....

What life events in your work have been significant for you?

I have seen and experienced many demanding and traumatic events during my working life. I joined the police to protect democracy and the protection of the rights of the public to live at peace has been at the heart of all my endeavours, and means the most to me. Examples would be found in my work In Northern Ireland where, amongst other things, I worked for the (EOD) bomb disposal unit, operations in Belfast and many others whilst in the police, including a particularly long and complex operation against gun runners which culminated in a lengthy trial at the Old Bailey - seeing all the accused brought to justice convicted and sentenced.

At one time, I did some training with Social Services. This brought greater understanding and enlightenment to the way I conducted my

It made me realise the need to consider all family members. Although my primary focus remained apprehending an alleged offender, it made me aware of the tremendous work of Social Services working with families who are in turmoil.

Is there a hymn or song that has a special place in your heart?

Good King Wenceslas is my utmost favourite amongst many loved hymns - the story of the poor man gathering winter fuel, in his time of need being helped by the thoughtfulness of the King and his servant always warms my heart.

Finally, what is it about your journey of faith that keeps you walking the path?


My journey of faith is light-footed - not for the study of the faith I don't pretend to be well-read, but I try and live out Christianity in practical ways. Going to church is only a small part but important, like filling up at the petrol station of life. Whatever turmoil and anxiety, chaos or trouble we have dealt with in the week, at church we meet those who welcome us with genuine care and with a smile, it allows us to take time for moments for inner reflection and prayer - it is restorative, and a real energiser for me.






Canon Palmer was on holiday from 7 October until 23 December.

STORRINGTON & SULLINGTON – REFLECTIONS OF THE PAST

TROUBLE AT HURSTON - PART 2

The Hurston disputes

On 11 February 1847, a court took evidence from James Searle of Cootham, then aged about 70 years old, told John Battcock that he worked for 29 years on Hurston Farm. When he first went to work on the farm in 1813, on thereabout, when Thomas Hayward took the farm and was master, he worked for him six years. He did not know Mr Hayward had any right to turn out any stock of any kind on Bog Common. He did not recollect Mr Hayward turned out any stock of any sort during the time he worked for him. After Hayward left, Mr Emery took the farm and had since worked for him for about 23 years.



This was witnessed by James Searle and John Battcock. On 11 Feb 1847, a further elderly farm labourer gave evidence. Richard Gilbert of Hurston went to work 70 years ago for John Saker James and worked for him until he left the farm and went to Hurston Street farm to live.

Richard Gilbert says he never understood any right to turn out any stock on Bog Common. Richard Gilbert says that John Saker had a house and croft at Hurston Street and they lived at the cottage, cut furze and heath on Bog Common, but no more than they could carry away on their backs. Master Ives was a tenant of the Manor of Storrington and would not let them carry away with a cart as he said they would be carrying it on another manor. The said Richard Gilbert lived with Henry Baker, farmer at Hurston Farm and worked for him 3 or 4 years and he never knew him turn out stock of any sort on Bog Common. Richard Gilbert worked for Mr Sam Heather, farmer, at Hurston Farm and also for Mr Hersea the whole time they had the said farm. Richard Gilbert says they did not make a practice of turning out stock during their time they had the farm on Bog Common. Richard Gilbert also worked for the Mr Hayward at Hurston Farm the whole time he lived there and he never knew him turn out any stock on Bog Common during the whole time he was at Hurston Farm. Richard Gilbert says he recollects a circumstance happening more than 50 years previously when a person of the name of William Smith was miller and foreman for a Mr Joseph Coote, who used Hurston Mill. At that time the said William Smith turned out his horses on Bog Common and Master Ives threatened to impound them if he turned them out any more. When he took no notice of what was said, Master Ives caught them on the Common again when Master Ives was driving them to the Manor pound. William Smith heard of it and went and overtook Master Ives and their horses and took them away and William Smith horse-whipped Master Ives for trying to impound his horses, for which Master Ives brought him to justice and had a trial with him at East Grinstead Assizes and gained the trial and made Smith pay a good deal of money.





Richard Mills went to live at Hurston Farm in the year 1813 with the Hayward farmer and Richard lived at Hurston for three years in constant employ on the farm and he says Mr Hayward did turn out sheep on Bog Common, but Master Ives made a complaint about his turning out his sheep on the Common.

Trouble at Hurston Mill did not end with the enclosures. This time it was Mr Emery at Hurston Mill at the centre of it, claiming that the lane leading to the Mill was a parish road and not private and the parish should pay for maintaining it. The vestry disagreed and said it was not a road, but merely a path needed for his Emery's and waggons and business. The dispute became very acrimonious and

no agreement could be reached. It went as far as the Spring Assizes at Brighton on 19 March 1875 before a Mr Justice Denman and a special jury to hear the case of Regina v Storrington. Mr Day QC and Mr Merrifield were instructed by Mr Edwards for the prosecution and Mr Sgt Parry and Mr Lumley Smith instructed by Mr Mant for the defendants. (Note from Joan Ham: The first day's proceedings I transcribed and later typed takes up 96 pages of A4!). The hearing was adjourned to the next day. After hearing the prosecution's case, with Mr Merrifield questioned and cross-questioned with the plans of the disputed 'road' before the court, and asked about the kind of traffic on it, he was pressed to describe the traffic, he said "People on horseback, horses, wagons, carts, carriages, Millers' Carts, Doctors, Butchers, Drapers and Grocers". Cross-examined, he asked "I suppose there is a Doctor here to prove that, is there? Do you know the name of the Doctor who you are going to call to say that he has travelled on the road?"

Reply: "I do not know the witnesses who are going to be called" And so it went on, - how many doctors, drapers, butchers etc.





Then came the agricultural workers, who must have had an enjoyable day out being transported to Brighton. These were Henry Lillywhite, aged 63, employed for 24 years, William Charman, 83 last Christmas, who had lived at Hurston all his life but who could not recall when the Turnpike road to Pulborough was made, William Lillywhite in his 77th year, William Jackson, shepherd aged 62, Isaac Elliot, a carter, George Cooper, 58, James House, land surveyor, 48, Charles Evans, foreman, 59, Francis Haveford, shepherd from 1851–1867 and now Lord Egremont's Bailiff, drovers, farmers, shepherds, a wheelwright, William Greenfield, a labourer 69 years old, roadmen, a miller.

Testimony from Samuel John Reed, aged 43, was a farm Bailiff with William Heath at that time (1858), was a way warden who repaired the Warren Road, charged the cost to the Vestry, but not Hurston Lane 'the other road'. A great deal of inconsequential questions and answers followed about road use, whether the usage was just to Mr Emery, or general, what waggons used it, and whether they were full or empty, and 70 year old Benjamin Lovatt was asked, cross-examined and re-examined, on whether he had ever ploughed across it when it was a 'green track'.

The Vestry Books were offered as evidence of the Parish repairing the road in 1865 but this was disputed. There was a great deal of argument as to what and was not evidence. Another problem was that Mr Day found reference to 21 gates across the road and questions were asked about their position. Even the proposed railway was mentioned and the question of a bridge to carry it over the public or private road. After much discussion as to what would be put in evidence, the prosecution case ended and the defendant's case was adjourned until the next day.

In 1876, a select committee of the House of Commons directed trustees of the Storrington and Wiston Turnpike to do no repairs after 1 November 1876 and the parish would be required to repair that part of the turnpike within their borders.

Roads became the responsibility of the new County Council in 1889.



Saturday and Sunday, 18 and 19 November, will see the 8th Annual Pro-Am Art Show and Sale. It will be open from 10am to 4pm with home-made refreshments available on both days. This event is always popular and is well worth a visit because there are some really talented artists in our area who will be exhibiting their work. Also, you might find the perfect Christmas present here!

On **Monday, 4 December**, the talk will be given by Richard Draycott on "The Surrey, Sussex and Kent Air Ambulance", which promises to be an interesting behind the scenes glimpse of a remarkable service.

Our current exhibition, "Round and About", is all about the district which surrounds Storrington, from Bury in the west over to the A24 and Ashington and Washington in the east. It is a wide area, with a history from pre-Roman times, but the Museum holds very few artefacts with which to fire visitors' imaginations. However we have unearthed (literally) an iron man from a Thakeham garden and we have crockery from The Frankland Arms, and a pot made by Reginald Fairfax Wells of West Chiltington.

Our area is full of extraordinary people, some nationally famous like Cicely Mary Barker, Francis Thompson, A. J. Cronin, and John Galsworthy, but there are others, equally interesting, whom we have scarcely heard of, such as Mr. Jose Weiss, the designer of the craft which made the first recorded manned glider flight in 1909 from Amberley Mount. There are stories about Queen Elizabeth I which can probably never be proved. We have paintings, postcards, and photos. If you have any interest in our area's history and stories you really should visit this little exhibition and then tell us your story about the area!

It is difficult to do justice in a review like this to the talk Julian Hoad presented on 2 October. Julian has a unique style, turning what threatened to be a rather dry talk into one that was both funny (with awful puns) and deadly serious. First, we were given an explanation: fungi are not animals, obviously, nor are they plants. They have a different reproductive system and a different composition, their cell walls not being made of cellulose but of chitin, like insects. They do not make chlorophyll, like plants, but are parasitic or saprophytic, depending on dead or decaying material for food.

What we think of as fungi – toadstools and mushrooms – are 'icebergs' in that most of their 'body' is underground and made of filaments. What we see is just the fruiting cap which produces the reproductive spores. Many fungi do not look like mushrooms. The family includes yeasts, moulds, mildews and toadstools. They have many uses (besides being houses for pixies) in food production and in drugs and pest controls. A great deal of research is being carried out on their potential uses in the pharmaceutical industry and in reforestations.

Many people go foraging for fungi, but, as in most pursuits, there are RULES, whether you want to eat them or just find them. It is illegal to collect fungi commercially. You need the landowner's permission or you might be trespassing. You must not collect where an SSSI is in place, nor in national nature reserves. When hunting for edible fungi you need the rules even more and you need either a good identification book or a very knowledgeable friend to advise you. There are hundreds of edible fungi and very few lethal ones BUT each lethal one has many cousins that look almost identical and you need to know which is which. Even if one person can eat and not be

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poisoned, it does not mean that someone else will fare the same. Some people are gluten intolerant and some are fungi intolerant. Mushrooms are not good food for people on certain drugs or for people who have problems with their kidneys. Some mushrooms must be cooked, and most must be eaten fresh, although some may be dried.

All through his talk Julian emphasised the dangers and the need to follow the rules and not take risks. His final words were "If in doubt, don't" - most emphatically.



Heidis

I only have a very small garden but in my tiny patch I try and attract as much wildlife as possible. I absolutely love diversity in the garden and always try to have this in mind when choosing my plants.

I am lucky enough to have a resident hedgehog which I feed, cat food and water in an upside down box that cats can't get in. I have also seen a hornet-mimic hoverfly and a hummingbird hawk moth!



I have let the cabbage white caterpillars decimate my nasturtiums as I love butterflies and let the mullein moths chomp through my mullein! I like to think I tick most of the boxes for attracting a diversity of creatures into my garden: a pond (a tin bath sunk into the ground) attracts frogs, toads, water snails and dragonflies, a patch of long grass for invertebrates, a bug hotel, birdfeeders, a bird box, some stagnant water for rat-tailed maggots which turn into drone flies-yep, ALL welcome in my garden!, areas left untidy and finally a huge variety of different flower types; not bad for 8 metres by 12!



Different bugs and flying creatures like a variety of flower types, the only type I don't bother with are double flower heads as these have no benefit for bees and other insects. Open flower types, typically of the daisy family, Asteracae, are great as insects have somewhere to land and easy access to lots of nectar if

there are lots of tiny flowers all close together. *Umbellifers* are also great for all sorts of flies (remember, if you get flies, you'll get birds).

This year in my garden my most bee and bug-tastic plants have been *Erysimum Bowles* mauve (perennial wallflower), Echinops (absolutely covered in bees in July and August) and right now sedums, all the better for being in full sun. We need diversity, it all helps with reducing pesticide use (I don't use any) as there is a natural predator/ food chain set up and we need to help the bees that are dying out. Plus, I LOVE a garden that's full of life and buzzing, don't you?

SOUTH DOWNS PROBUS

Any mention or sight of the Spitfire brings a lift to the heart, the unmistakeable roar of the Rolls Royce engines, the distinctive elliptical shape of the wings and the graceful streamlined fuselage all contribute to its reputation. We remember how the Spitfire saved our country in the summer of 1940 from imminent and almost certain invasion by Nazi Germany with its contribution to the defeat of a much larger and stronger German Airforce, which never obtained the air supremacy it needed.

The speaker at our September meeting was Rodney Clarke, a member of South Downs Probus, who introduced his talk with a question 'the Spitfire - why was it so good?'. The story starts with the seaplane manufactured by the Super Marine Aircraft Company and designed by R J Mitchell, which won the prestigious Schneider Trophy in 1931 reaching a speed of 358 miles per hour (over 400 downwind) which was 200mph faster than any comparative aircraft at that time. The Air Ministry required a new fighter with certain clear specifications, must be easy to fly, slow landing speed, exceptional high altitude performance, good forward vision and easy cockpit release to enable the pilot to bale out in an emergency.

The development of the Spitfire from R J Mitchell's seaplane in order to meet these requirements was, essentially, by excellent team work. Mitchell died in 1937 and Joe Smith then headed the design team, but Mitchell had already appointed in 1931 a Canadian, Beverly Shenstone, to make essential modifications to 'clean up' the fuselage in order to improve the aerodynamics. Shenstone was undoubtedly a genius, described as the finest aerodynamic engine ever. He had worked for two years with the German Aircraft Company Fokker, where he was dismayed to find the Fokker 190 much faster that its British equivalent. He had absorbed, in the two years at Fokker, much valuable technical information which proved invaluable to his work on the Spitfire.

In the Battle of Britain, although the German fighter planes, the Messerschmitt ME109 and the Fokker 190 were faster, it was the manoeuvrability, the ability to make very tight circles, that was the reason for the Spitfire's success, This was especially the case when it performed at heights of above 20,000 feet to attack the German Bombers. Further modifications were made over the years to the power of the engines and to improve fire power so that the latest is now Mark 24 - so many changes since the Mark 2 and 3 of the Battle of Britain.

We know that the reason for the Spitfire success was that it met all the exacting requirements by the teamwork of some very remarkable aeronautical engineers.

Thank you, Rodney, for a very stimulating talk.

STORRINGTON COMMUNITY SPEEDWATCH SCHEME MOVES

TO A NEW LEVEL!

Storrington Community Speedwatch scheme has been in place enhancing Storrington's road safety and driver behaviour since October 2011.



Since then data obtained from West Sussex

County Council shows that over the last six years, a clear reduction in excessive speeds at the main roads through the town has been achieved.



Nevertheless, in 2016 there were on average more than 5,000 vehicles a day recorded as driving at excessive speeds (ie 35mph and over). The Scheme's committee believe that the roadside monitoring by its 20+ volunteers has had a significant effect in reducing

speed, particularly with local drivers, who for the most part are very supportive of CSW. The vehicle activated speed (VAS) signs also make a significant contribution, and the installation of additional ones would be welcomed.

Recently, senior members of the Scheme met with senior police officers from the Sussex Police Roads Policing Unit, who were very complimentary about the efficiency and commitment of the Storrington volunteers.

Improvements to the communication links between Police and the Scheme, and for delivering high quality training to new recruits were discussed, and actions agreed to achieve these

The scheme is just one of many across the East and West Sussex area, and achieves its success entirely due to the commitment of those volunteers. To progress further, the Storrington Scheme is now keen to talk with anyone who would like to join the group.

On Saturday morning, **18 November**, Storrington Speedwatch members will be displaying their information outside Waitrose, in Mill Square, and will be keen to welcome new volunteers.

In the meantime -

If you are over 18, resident in the parish of Storrington & Sullington, have access to e-mail and can offer at least one hour per week free during most weeks you will be very welcome to join them. This could be either by the roadside,



or helping with computer admin at home.

There is training which just takes one session of about an hour, followed by support from the Co-ordinators and Team Leaders. The volunteers operate only during daylight and good weather conditions. New volunteers will join experienced teams to gain confidence. Some current volunteers just do roadside sessions during warmer months from April to October, when the days are longer and more sessions can be run.

By joining this scheme, you will be making a major contribution to help local residents, visitors and other drivers improve their driving behaviour on the road, by a visible presence at a number of designated sites on the main roads accessing the village. you will also enjoy the sociable nature of the roadside session held in the open air!
