



#### 'God is... God is in Jesus... Therefore, there is hope.

'The 3 Line Creed' - Bishop David Jenkins

I hope and pray you're still 'seeing' with Easter eyes - even if the Easter eggs are all gone...

Quite a few years ago now, I was a curate in training at Sherborne Abbey. Being 'Dorset's Cathedral' we often had the great and good come and preach. As the sermon was being preached, my training Incumbent

- the equally great and good Canon Eric Woods (who once said of his present crop of curates 'they all seem to come from Marks and Spencers these days' - ow!), would more often than not, adopt a particularly louche slouch in his stall and, across the gaping chancel floor of that great abbey church, mouth the words to me... 'so what?!?'

If I learnt anything from my Sherborne days, it was to be always ready to hold my faith and the *religious activity* often purporting to be my priestly ministry - or that of the wider church, to the acid test of 'so what?!?'.

In this Diocesan Year of Faith, as we are invited to examine our faith in the light of the historic but still contemporary *Nicene Creed*, 'so what' is still a very good question to ask. I was particularly struck by this when twenty or so of us at St Mary's, Storrington, followed the Lent course 'I Believe'. Many of us expected a fairly rigorous trip down doctrinal lane but instead we were invited to reflect on how the heart of the Christian faith, summarised by the Creed, was illustrated in the lives of others who were truly great and good. Yet these figures did much more than simply illustrate or inspire. They *incarnated* the teaching of the Creed. Like Jesus, they made the things of God and God's kingdom in Christ real.

When faith gets real there's no need to ask 'so what'. It's clear to see and feel in transformed lives transforming lives...

Our Lent group also asked the 'so what' question in how having 'faith cred' isn't just about feeling personally secure in our faith or putting it into action. We questioned how our 'faith cred' is there to enable us to risk ourselves in reaching out to others with the good news of the fullness of life God gives us in Jesus. That inevitably led to the more challenging question: 'Do we have faith in ourselves?'. As Christians we have a faith to share The Faith....

On **Wednesday 21<sup>st</sup> May, Bishop Ruth will visit St Mary's, Storrington**, to confirm the faith of those who have asked that same question. Please pray for all those being prepared for confirmation from across our Deanery and for Bishop Ruth.

And yes, there's still time to ask that question of yourself or of others in and around your local Christian community and accept the invitation to have your faith affirmed and confirmed.

Assuring you of my prayers and trusting to yours – in faith, hope and love.

We look forward to welcoming Joel and his family sometime this summer.




### **SPRING CLEANING**AT ST MARY'S, STORRINGTON

Aurelia and her family belong to the Indigenous Q'eqchi' community of the Alta Verapaz region, Guatemala, Central America. The climate crisis and industrial plantations have changed Q'eqchi' land dramatically. Gruelling heatwaves, savage storms and unpredictable seasons are ravaging farms. Industrial agriculture is taking over the last of the region's natural resources to feed the world's richest countries. Many of the vital crops that Aurelia depends on are withering and dying before her eyes.

Aurelia recently discovered the work of Christian Aid's partner organisation, Congcoop, and put herself forward to attend the specialist agricultural training on offer, along with 22 members of nearby communities. With funding from Christian Aid, Congcoop supports communities to return to indigenous farming practices and adopt agroecological approaches that conserve their land, culture and livelihood. Agro-ecology, put simply, is farming in a sustainable way that works with, not against, nature. It's the application of ecological principles in farming – a blend of ancient and modern wisdom.

Thanks to Aurelia's ever-growing knowledge base, she's now cultivating cacao, sugarcane, cinnamon, corn and pineapples. It's steady progress that holds promise. Aurelia's resolute hope has also inspired her to develop and lead other activities in her community, including producing chocolate, establishing a farmers' market, and fighting for women's rights.

This year there will be Christian Aid envelopes at the back of St Mary's Church, Storrington for individual donations.

#### Messiness or mossiness

My husband and I have been together a long time and like many longterm relationships it has a few little cracks and fault lines. For example, football; I shall only say Caraboa Cup, 2:1 on our wedding anniversary, and try not to look smug! Music is another; his genre of choice is country and western; I am sure all country and western songs are called "I'm so lonesome I could die." [see footnote]. However, neither have obvious environmental connections. A third matter of discussion, even dispute, is moss; or more specifically moss on our roof. As you can see in the picture we have quite a lot of moss on our house roof. From time to time, about once a year, we have to get up ladders and clear the gutters, and also sweep up whatever falls onto the ground. This doesn't bother me at all, and meanwhile my husband gazes longingly at pristine roofs, not just newly built houses, but also where a commercial company has come along and cleaned the roof. Inevitably he'll say, "Shouldn't we get our roof cleaned?" A few years ago, I asked a local roofer who had come to fix a couple of slipped tiles; his view was that if your tiles are sound moss does no harm and there's no need to remove it. This was of course the answer I wanted. So, are there advantages to having moss on the roof?

Well, first moss is a keystone genus, which means it punches above its weight as a habitat in supporting biodiversity, especially invertebrates. It's mainly microorganisms like nematodes, mites and springtails that live in and on moss. Viewed close through a microscope, these might not look attractive, but they're vital parts of the ecosystem and food chain that ultimately keeps us fed. Moss on roofs absorbs rainwater, so in heavy downpours it slows the flow of water and stops your gutters

getting overwhelmed. It provides easily accessible nesting material for birds, and a ready-made feast. It can also give your house a bit of insulation.

Consider also that there's no such thing as gentle removal. Most companies offering moss removal use lots of water and harsh chemicals. On balance, I want to keep the moss.

#### Water soluble - not!

Every news bulletin has some eco story; this morning wasn't any different. And news stories about pollution of our rivers and seas aren't new either, but this one took me by surprise. You probably heard it too. Studies by the Brunel University, Imperial College and the University of Portsmouth found over 100 chemicals in the water of two south coast harbours. The concentrations were particularly high when water companies had been discharging untreated sewage into the harbours. Now, none of this is new. What startled me was that the chemicals included prescription drugs, as well as illegal drugs. I can understand someone flushing their illegal drugs down the loo, but all local pharmacists will take back unused and out of date over-the-counter and prescription drugs. All you have to do is take them in and hand them over. Another surprise was that researchers identified high concentrations of the insecticides used for flea and tick treatment on dogs and cats, which are really harmful to sea life. I'm not sure whether people are tipping unused products down the sink, or the products are washing off the animals.

#### Little joys

I'm writing this on a Monday, and I have my "start of the week" routines. Some of these are mundane, like clean the dishwasher, change the towels etc, but one task I particularly enjoy is winding my clocks. I have

three that need winding, and two of them are about 100 years old. None keep fully accurate time, but that doesn't trouble me. They don't need batteries or power; if they're looked after they should last another 100 years. This started me thinking about the old tools or gadgets that I use





regularly. I have some of my mother's kitchen utensils, but the gadget that always makes me smile is my father's funny little wooden guillotine for cutting paper neatly. It was made in England and has a patent number. He must have had it at work

because it has his name on it. It is cunningly made as you can see in the pictures. What are your little eco joys?

In the ten-over match, our side batted first and scored 126 for the loss of two wickets, three of our batters retiring not out. Thomas made 44 and Massimo and Archie both contributed 21, with 27 runs being hit off the last over. Worthing's reply fell well short at 77 for three wickets thanks to the containing bowling of Finlay, Rowan, and Massimo who achieved a double wicket maiden.

With ever more teams being fielded the Club has a growing need for more scorers, umpires and coaches so we would like to hear from anyone who would like to get involved in any of these crucial support roles. Enquiries again should be directed to Martin Fisher.

A President's Day Match and fund raising is being planned for the Spring Bank Holiday on Monday May  $26^{\text{th}}$  for which further details are to be publicised. Our current fund raising target for the much needed pavilion re-development, is just over £100k after taking in to account pledges and the Club's contribution amounting to £140k so far. A recent quiz raised nearly £500.

Some of our older readers who have followed Storrington cricket over the years might remember Basil Davis who was once described as a marathon bowler with a metronomic action during his twenty playing years and before he emigrated to Australia in 1973. "Bas", as he was popularly known, passed away peacefully in Perth in March after an innings of 90 years. His stats as a "quickie" who would often bowl twenty over spells and always up the slope from the car park end must be unsurpassed in the Club's long history. Records show that Bas bowled 9,624 overs, including 2,527 maidens, for 1,836 wickets. He took more than 100 wickets in a season on at least a dozen occasions with 149 wickets in 1961 being his biggest haul. He took five or more wickets in an innings on 135 occasions and his best performance was 9 for 48 against Cuckfield in 1959. It's estimated that his bowling run-ups amounted to 850 miles in the course of twenty years! Bas continued playing in Australia for a number of years before taking up umpiring. In a letter to the Club from Australia in September 1973 he commented that the training regime in Australia was much more exerting than the devil-may-care attitude at Storrington! His wife Jane survives him in a residential care home. Bas is remembered by several past and current members of the Club, for example Keith Miller who was a contemporary player, Geoff Carter who both scored and played in matches that Bas played in, and Colin Harrison who was 14 years old when he played his first game for the senior side in 1967 and had a last wicket partnership with Bas that yielded more runs than any of the earlier nine wickets!



#### STORRINGTON & SULLINGTON - REFLECTIONS OF THE PAST

#### REVD HENRY PALMER AT SULLINGTON - PART 35

Continuing the 4 week Continental Tour [1865]

#### Aug 29 Tues and 30

Heavy thunderstorms about, vivid lightning - fine otherwise. Must throw two days into one. Left Martigny early on Tues by train for Sion: thence by a slow diligence to Brieg, which we did not reach till 6.30 passing down the valley of the Rhone, wide and marshy until you arrive at Brieg which forms the head of a cul-de-sac. We dined here (Angleterre - avoid the other shop) and awaited the diligence for the Simplon and Baveno. Brieg wild and picturesque: a good view of the valley of the Church. Got away at 8.40pm having secured the coupé of a capital and began the ascent with 5 horses, an occasional struggle to trot for 10 or 20 seconds was all that broke the walk up till 1.30. The lightning occasionally lit up the road and showed us its grandeur, and our lights showed us clearly enough the caverns and tunnels and galleries thro' which we passed - after passing the summit at 1.30 and the hospice of S. Bernard monks we went down at a fair trot to Simplon where we changed, getting out to stretch our legs. The air cut us through with its rawness, and we soon got back again to the shelter of the diligence. It was unfortunately too dark to see the great beauty of the Gorge of Gondo, which we now passed in all its details, yet the peculiar nature of the light we had, afforded by our two excellent lamps and the vivid lightning occasionally gave us a peep of what seemed the very depths of the earth when compared with the precipices which frowned above us on both sides.

We were about 1 hour from Simplon when I saw from my window what seemed to me like a small avalanche tumbled across our road, and almost immediately a huge piece of rock blocked the way of the fore wheels, and the driver brought his five horses at the standstill – we all got out – there was the diligence with its wheels on the edge of the road and resting in a crack formed by the breaking away of the solid curb that runs the whole length of the river side – a great rock, some 15 feet long and 5 high and broad lay across the path, and a large hole on the river side entirely cut us off from the passage thro'. Had we gone over the side we should have been capsized into a tumbling stream some 12 feet down perfectly sheer and been cracked and smashed against the rocky boulders that lie strewn about its bed: our intelligent horses saved us: they saw the danger and pulled themselves up before anything happened (so amiable, so kind).

We were but a few hundred yards from one of the local stations and soon our driver brought up a force of 6 men with planks and crowbars – and by forming a temporary bridge over the hole we got the diligence across safely, and so down to <a href="Isealto">Isealta</a> where we turned out to be examined by the douaniers of Italy. Daybreak gave us all the rest of this splendid road, and by 6 we were breakfasting at <a href="Domo d'Ossola">Domo d'Ossola</a> and rejoicing in the softness of the Italian air after the perils of the night and the fog and cold of the mountain.

#### Domo D'Ossola - Sesto Calende - Milan

Then on by very straight roads and amid a fertile country to <u>Baveno</u> on the Lago Maggiore. Never was water so beautifully coloured, nor land so bright and lively as this – overall the velvety haze of heat and when after dejeuner we rowed, gondola fashion, to the Borromean Islands the picture was more softly beautiful than any I have seen. We were not permitted to land, as the thunderstorm which had nearly washed us into the Gorge of Gondo had cut all the Count's gardens to pieces and they were not fit to be seen at all. The deep blue green colour of the water of the lake is supremely beautiful and as we passed under the Isola Bella the Count Borromeo appeared at the window, an old dignified man, the descendant of a noble race. A new hotel is being built on the lake at Barento, and is likely to become a great favourite – the landlord of the <u>Belle Vue</u>, who is its proprietor, will deserve custom.

Left by boat for <u>Sesto Calende</u> at 3 and reached it at 6 – being stopped half an hour at Arona – the railway took us from here to Milan, for Galerato by 8.30 and so we finished our long course! The evening entrance into Milan was overpowering, the finest station I have ever seen, the noblest gates and streets and the whole place alive with light, and people on horse and foot. We put up at a fine hotel called the <u>Hotel de Ville</u>.

#### Aug 31

Showery but generally fine. Our day at Milan has been well occupied with the cathedral, the Leonardo da Vinci, the Arena, the Arch of Peace, the church of Saint Ambrose and the English garden with the Italian band. The cathedral is grand, yet paltry – the Leonardo in better preservation than we expected to find it and well repays a visit, the Arena very curious as a specimen of a modern Amphitheatre à la Romani, the church of S. Ambrose a very mine of interest, and the band enchanting. Altogether, the day at M. has been a very great success and leaves a good impression.

#### September 1, Friday Fine, hot.

#### Milan - Verona

Left Milano at 7.45am and after a very pleasant railway journey of 103 miles arrived at Verona at 1.30 – 1 hour of this time was spent at the Austrian frontier station, Peschiera. Here we changed trains and were examined – passports and baggage – here also we were all quietly entrapped together, and smoked for 15 min with chloride of lime – for fear of bringing cholera into the dominions of H.M. Francis Joseph II. The scene was most ludicrous when the fumes began to take effect as everybody began to spit and sputter and put their handkerchiefs up to their noses in self-defence, the whole thing was worthy of the pencil of Leeds, who would have done it ample justice.

The lake of Garda, beautifully blue, is passed near this station, and we were fortunate in getting it in superb loveliness. With F.G.V. as a guide we have seen much, perhaps nearly all worth seeing in Verona. Being well up in 'Ruskin' and Murray the churches were properly investigated – i.e. the three <u>S. Zanon</u>, <u>S. Anastasia</u> and the <u>Duomo</u> – all interesting for their architecture, and early Lombard work, especially the first – Z, was bishop and is patron saint of Verona. The church is a basilica of noble type with exquisite <u>bronze doors</u>, huge lavers of porphyry, gigantic holy water basins, fine wood roof painted, the whole seemed much like Wilton.

In the evening we went to the Jardino Giusto [Giardino Giusti] on the other side of the Adige – private gardens which command a fine view of the city – which we caught just at sunset, and so met with a painting purple, green and pink which I shall never forget.

The Coliseum most interesting - the Austrian soldiers crowd the place – they meet you at every turn, every second house a barrack – one can well understand the feelings with which a people like the Milanese hated the very sight of such an armed occupation, and put their officers in Coventry by way of revenge.

The tombs of the <u>Scalion</u> (Scaligeri) are most beautiful pieces of <u>Gothic architecture</u>, and the <u>ironwork</u> which surrounds them most elegant and artistic – these Scalieri reigned in Verona 1257-1405. Mastino was the first – Alberto the second, both excellent rulers.

In a world where truth doesn't seem important and hopeful fantasies are preferred to reality, it would be normal for prime protected rainforest to be chopped down to make way for a four lane highway. Crazy! Yet this is actually happening in Brazil. It's not for the usual profiteering land-grab, but worse: to provide easy access to COP30. The supposed purpose of which is to agree ways to save the climate from disastrous

Just one breath-taking example of how seriously the problem is taken. We laugh at the idiot sawing off the branch on which he is sitting but we will not find it so funny when climate reality fully exposes our hopeful fantasies, and we've had plenty of wake-up calls, such as floods and droughts, most recently the wildfire in South Korea.

A group of Brazilian leaders' paper A Call to Action towards COP30 has been presented to their Minister on climate change, which reads: "Our territories are being destroyed. We witness the destruction of the Amazon, other ecosystems and the people, caused by large scale agriculture, mining and fossil fuel extraction." It will be interesting to see if these facts have any effect.

If previous meetings are anything to go by, in October COP30 will be swamped by oil and gas producers, solemn promises to reduce greenhouse gases will be made, which will be routinely broken. Short term interests will trump long term essential needs. We can only hope the outcome will be more positive this time. It is up to us to make our voices heard through our MPs.

#### **WEATHER** WATCH

The rain taps were well and truly turned off across the 3 Heralds area during March with just 4.5mm of rainfall in my gauge. The normal is around 60mm. It was the driest March since 1961. After an often gloomy winter, the clouds parted to reveal the sun in large amounts and by day the temperature was above par. However, there were many clear nights, and this led to quite a chill by dawn. I recorded 13 air frosts and as many as 20 grass frosts. They seared some of the camellia blooms in my garden.



There large diurnal (24 hr) variations temperature, and it was a case on quite a few days of winter at dawn and spring like conditions during the afternoon. The vernal or spring equinox where there is equal day and night and cited by some as the



first day of spring varies around the 21st and this year it was on the 20th. It was a gloriously sunny day, and the temperature peaked at just over 18 °C during the afternoon. But over the month as a whole the mean temperature worked out at just under a degree above the average.

At the end of February, the ground was saturated and there was standing water in some local fields and gardens. By the end of March an old weather saying was very apt. It tells us that, "A peck of March dust is worth a King's ransom in gold". It was especially appropriate to farmers, horticulturalists and gardeners as some dry weather in March was needed to work the land for spring sowing and summer and autumn





crops, particularly in days before modern mechanization. This March had 24 days with no measurable rain and proved quite a contrast with the recent March of 2023 when quantifiable rain fell on 25 days amounting to 149mm. Regarding a lack of rain, the driest March across Sussex was 1929 when virtually no precipitation fell.

As expected from such a dry month, there were no storms and on half the days there was little or no wind. On only one day was a little sleet observed and that was after dark on the 14th. Thunder was absent but there were a couple of days when hailstones fell but they were quite small and did not amount to much. There were three days with fog at the observing time of 09.00hrs GMT and on the 5th it persisted until noon, but the afternoon was then sunny.

March 2025 came in like a lamb and went out in similar fashion with quiet sunny weather. Will the dry spring-like weather continue in April or will the weather pendulum swing in the reverse direction? April can be a very fickle month. Read next month's Weather Watch to read what happened.




